OUR FOUNTAIN.

Mr. Ruhl in his first Drug Store.

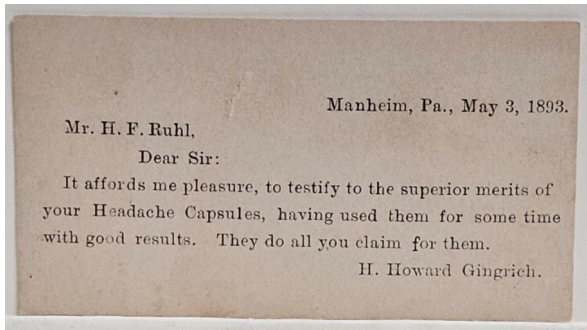
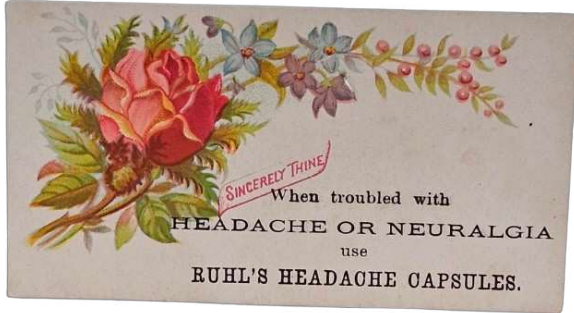


We received three labels under glass apothecary bottles and a smaller embossed one. Two fancy candy jars and they can be seen in the above "OUR FOUNTAIN" picture. Two Stiegel-type items, one a copper-wheel engraved flip and the other a ribbed wineglass, displayed on the museum's lighted bases. A special metal canister carried by Dr. John Francis Dunlap, an early Manheim physician, when visiting patients in their homes. Also pictured is the underside of the container-type cap and lead clippings found in the cap. The early belief was that lead had healing qualities.

Harry Fry Ruhl, Sr., opened his drugstore business in 1891 in the drugstore building formerly occupied by Josiah Landis, at 51 South Prussian Street, now Main Street. He later moved his business to a location owned by his father, Samuel Ruhl, at 75 South Prussian St. Samuel was a carpenter and cabinet-maker. HMPF has one of Samuel's well-worn planes and a picture of Samuel at his workbench.

The reason for this article is because HMPF just received artifacts from Harry F. Ruhl's first drugstore, 1891. The items were given to HMPF in memory of the Ruhl family and Dorothy Ruhl, Harry F. Ruhl's granddaughter, and some are pictured in the next column.

It's interesting that the trade card pictured below has a Headache Capsule endorsement on the reverse with a date of May 3, 1893. Mr. Ruhl opened his store in 1891 and by 1893 was compounding his own remedies.



Perhaps some of what Mr. Ruhl compounded was based on ailments listed in the book that HMPF acquired at the sale of miscellaneous small items from the Ruhl Drug Store. Mr. Young, the person who purchased the Ruhl Drug Store business from Harry Ruhl, Jr., sold the business to Sloan's Pharmacy and later had an auction at his home along Penryn Road. It was at this sale that HMPF acquired the ailments book and a few other small Ruhl Drug Store items.



Mr. Ruhl was a very enterprising individual. Along with having a drugstore business, he did some job printing and photography, as the trade card and real photo postcard below indicate. Mr. Ruhl produced many real photo postcards, but unfortunately he did not stamp on the back of the postcards that they were by Harry F. Ruhl, as did Charles Ensminger with the Ensminger Postal Series, Manheim, Pa.

Baskets of apples could be seen in front of the store, and at the back of the interior of the store, one could sense the fragrance of apples from those in storage.
